In November, United Cerebral Palsy Association of Greater Chicago, in collaboration with its e-waste recycling and refurbishment program, Assistive Technology Exchange Network, which recycles donated computers and distributes them free to children with disabilities in Illinois, delivered refurbished technology to schools in all 102 Illinois counties.

Assistive Technology Network refurbishes electronic and computer-related items (e.g., software programs, monitors, keyboards, cell phones, printers and other peripherals) in any working condition. The network has 14 electronic collection sites throughout Chicago, including 332 W. Harrison St., Oak Park.
